The first has been our engagement with government leadership, where we tried to encourage an ongoing dialogue with key decision makers on management policy, strategy, regulatory, governance, enforcement and project matters related to heritage management. During the past year, the SHS executive committee had called on the Sarawak Chief Minister, Datuk Amar Abang Zohari Abang Openg, where we presented SHS' perspectives on Sarawak heritage, its critical issues and problems and possible resolutions. On the suggestion of CM, we also met with the Minister of Tourism, Arts, Culture, Youth & Sports, Datuk Haji Abdul Karim Rahman Hamzah, to delve deeper into specific initiatives. We were further invited by the Ministry of Urban Development and Natural Resources to participate in a Lab on heritage conservation.

The second area has been our ongoing awareness building programmes for members and the public. This has been through study visits, film shows, workshops and the SHS "Heritage Speaker Series" of talks. Together with our website and FB presence, we believe that this help to deepen public appreciation of Sarawak's unique cultural heritage – both tangible and intangible - and highlight the importance of heritage protection, conservation and management.

I am happy to report that the Registrar of Societies has approved our revised Constitution which was passed at the previous AGM. Our proceedings will be in accordance with the new Constitution which is available on the SHS website.

Going forward, I hope many more members of the public will join SHS. A strong and stable membership base will reinforce SHS' credibility, power of advocacy, and capacity to engage government and private entities in dialogue. I call on current members to come forward and contribute actively to our initiatives with your varied technical, marketing or administrative skills. With stronger membership and germane competencies, it would be advantageous to co-opt a Panel of Specialists to look into different spheres of Sarawak's tangible and intangible heritage. SHS requires fresh inputs and so would like to request members to invite your friends and family who may be motivated by SHS' cause to sign up.

Finally, I would like to extend my sincere thanks to the Committee and all the other members who have helped and supported SHS throughout the year, including other civil society organisations such as Friends of Sarawak Museum (FoSM), Pertubuhan Arkitek Malaysia (PAM) and Borneo Art Collective. ACTIVITIES

Position Paper

In November 2017, we developed a Position Paper to introduce the Sarawak Heritage Society and to elaborate on the society's views relating to heritage protection, conservation and management. We clarify how SHS can play a key role in advocating for heritage issues and raising public awareness. We also express what we hope to see from the Government and other stakeholders in Sarawak [see Appendix].

Government Engagement

Meeting with Sarawak Chief Minister

On 14th Nov 2017, the SHS Committee led by its President Dato Sri Robert Jacob Ridu paid a courtesy call to the Chief Minister of Sarawak Datuk Patinggi Abang Zohari Abang Openg.



We presented the SHS position paper and discussed the status of Sarawak's heritage conservation framework, how SHS can play a key role to pilot a baseline study on Kuching's heritage zone and to work with the State Government to strengthen our cultural heritage management. We also raised the possibility of adopting a Heritage Impact Assessment approach to future development proposals.

Meeting with Minister of Tourism, Arts, Culture, Youth & Sports

On 15th December 2017, The Sarawak Heritage Society Committee led by its President Dato Sri Robert Jacob Ridu paid a courtesy call to the Minister of Tourism, Arts, Culture, Youth and Sports, Datuk Abdul Karim Rahman Hamzah.

We explored a variety of heritage management issues and proposed a built heritage baseline study, using independent consultants, that would include a technical assessment of buildings and documenting heritage assets within defined "heritage zones" of Kuching.



Participation in Ministry of Urban Development and natural Resources (MUDNR) 'Lab' on Heritage Protection & Conservation

On 11-12th January 2018, SHS President and three members of the Executive Committee attended a two-day Lab organised by the Ministry of Urban Development and Natural Resources. Invited were representatives from various government departments and other stakeholders. The SHS team emphasised the importance of carrying out a Technical Baseline Study of Old Kuching, as well as an Institutional Baseline Study/Review.

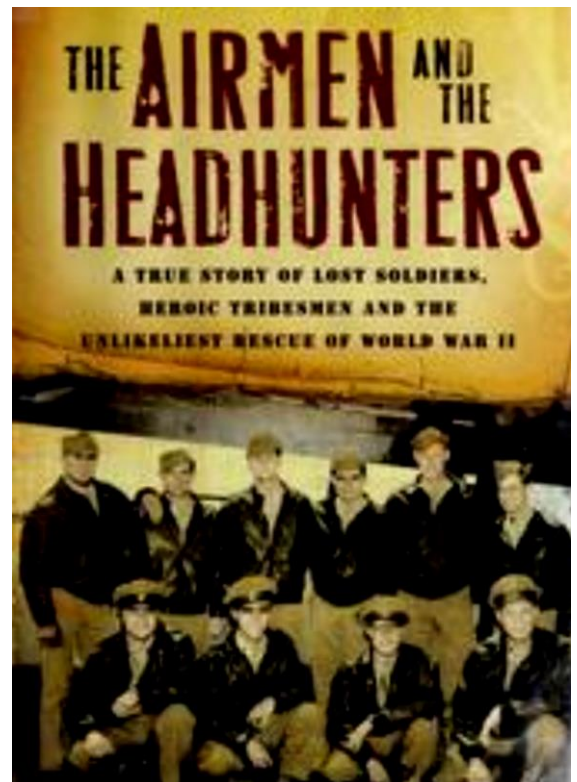

Film Screening

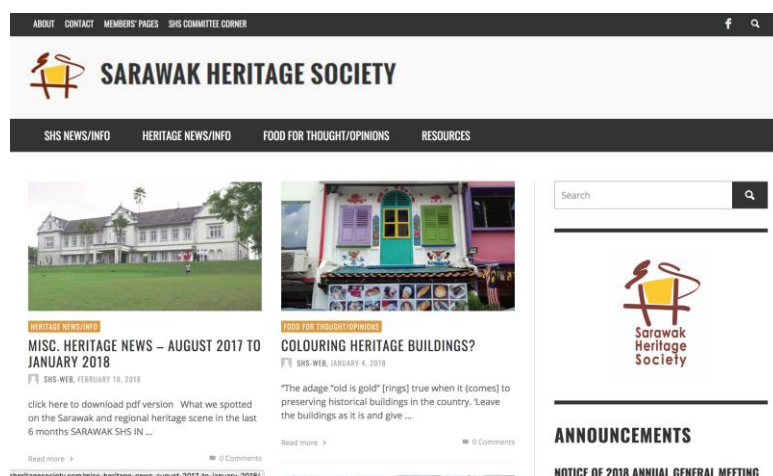
On 4th July 2017 at 7pm, a screening of “The Airmen and the Headhunters” took place at the Auditorium of the Islamic Information Centre, Kuching. This was a survival story of survival and heroism based on a 1944 event where a scattered crew of military airmen from a B-24 bomber shot down off the Borneo coast were met by Dayak tribesmen from the mountainous jungle. Together the unlikely combined force helped destroy one of the last Japanese strongholds. Admission was free but the invitation was restricted to members and their families.

HERITAGE SOCIETY PAYS COURTESY CALL ON KARIM

Heritage society pays courtesy call on Karim

KUCHING: The executive committee of Sarawak Heritage Society (SHS) paid a courtesy call on Datuk Abdul Karim Rahman Hamzah, Minister of Tourism, Arts, Culture, Youth and Sports at his office in Baitulmakmur here, yesterday.

Led by its president Dato Sri Robert Jacob Ridu, the visit was a follow-up to a recent meeting with the Chief Minister, Datuk Patinggi Abang Johari Tun Openg.

Karim informed the visitors that the State's policy, legislative and regulatory framework on heritage assets as well as the Heritage Ordinance needs to be revisited.

Such action is needed to ensure that heritage management is consistent and coordinated with a clear partition of scope, not overlapping with that of the Sarawak Museum's.

He also acknowledged the tension between heritage conservation and development.

"I believe that a pragmatic balance between economic development and conservation can be achieved when a proper heritage management framework is in place," he said.

Meanwhile, SHS agreed with the Minister that with innovative planning and adaptive reuse, the integrity of our cultural and built heritage need not be compromised.

SHS explored a variety of heritage management issues with the Minister and found that its views are generally in sync with the Sarawak Government's plans and intentions for heritage management.

Among the areas proposed was a baseline study using independent consultants which would include technical assessment of buildings and documenting heritage assets within defined 'heritage zones'.

The results of such a study would provide valuable inputs for heritage management, city planning and urban rejuvenation.

SHS also requested for more government fund allocation to maintain listed government-owned heritage sites as well as incentivise private owners to maintain their heritage assets.

Karim acknowledged a common shared vision with SHS and encouraged its members to hold further discussions with the Sarawak Museum for future collaboration.

Also present at the discussion were Tazudin Mohtar and Harry Jobia, representatives of the Sarawak Museum.

Former heart patient climbs Mt Santubong

KUCHING: Three years ago, nine-year-old Siti Nur Intan Hidayah Azhar had undergone a corrective surgery to treat her congenital heart defect condition and two months ago she proved to others that former heart patients were capable of doing outdoor activities.

The Year Three student of Sekolah Kebangsaan Sungai Gau, 45, showing her commitment and grit in overcoming the challenge.

"My parents brought me along the climbing mission after the doctor who treated me at the National Heart Institute (NHI) confirmed that I was capable of doing outdoor activities. This is my first time climbing Mount Santubong," she told Bernama here.

Siti Nur Intan Hidayah was the youngest climber among 28 participants of the 'Komuniti Sihat Perkasia Negara' (Kospen) programme and Sultan Haji Ahmad Shah Hospital, in Temerloh, Pahang who recently joined in the mission to climb the legendary mountain.

She said the hardships faced when scaling the mountain was unforgettable and she nearly gave up due to exhaustion.

"I never expected that I would be able to reach the top of Mount Santubong. I was able to do this with the support of other participants and if given the opportunity I would like to join other climbing missions in the future," she added. - Bernama

Call for heritage buildings to be re-purposed

KUCHING: The Sarawak Heritage Society has called for the re-purposing of heritage buildings here into community spaces.

In a press statement issued on Tuesday in conjunction with a public lecture under its 'Heritage Speaker Series', the society said Sarawak is currently facing heritage conservation challenges.

"Kuching has many heritage buildings, which no longer serve their original function, but rather than being demolished they can be innovatively repurposed into community spaces," said the society.

The society suggested among the potential projects would be the restoration and adaptive reuse of the old Brooke Dockyard facilities.

On the public lecture, 'Leading with the Transformation on Cultural Identity: The Case of the Refurbishment of Garciminoz Castle' by international award-winning architect Dr Izaskun Chinchilla, the society said the adaptive reuse of a medieval castle could be a useful update of innovative ways by which cultural heritage can be conserved and how they may be applied to Sarawak.

Garciminoz Castle in Spain was first the site of a 16th-century Moorish citadel, before becoming the residence of the prominent Villena family in the 18th century and, from 1706, the site of a church that is still in use today.

Chinchilla shared on how this innovative refurbishment consolidates and reinforces ruins from Arab, Medieval and Neoclassical times, adding contemporary architectural value to the building's heritage, while transforming the castle into sustainable and safe spaces for the public to visit.

The refurbishment also integrates digital media and new meeting venues in order to engage the local population socially and facilitate renewed cultural and economic activities in a deprived rural area.

The project aimed to show how innovative architectural design can refurbish heritage sites imaginatively, while also strengthening local economies, enabling public access for all, and supporting their socially and environmentally sustainable use for the long term.

Chinchilla is an honorary fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects.

In addition to being principal partner at Izaskun Chinchilla Architects, she is also senior teaching fellow, senior research associate, and public engagement fellow at the Bartlett School of Architecture, University College of London.

SHS: Govt committed to heritage conservation

KUCHING: The Sarawak Heritage Society (SHS) is optimistic that the state government is on the same page when it comes to the conservation of the state's heritage.

Following a courtesy call on Chief Minister Datuk Patinggi Abang Johari Tun Openg yesterday, SHS president Datu Sri Robert Jacob Ridu told The Borneo Post that three points on heritage conservation were discussed.

"We brought up the subject of a database on heritage areas so that we will know how to zone areas in Kuching based on heritage, and Abang Johari already has that in mind," said Ridu.

SHS also mooted the idea of a Heritage Impact Assessment (HIA), similar to an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA).

"In most developments, there's

an EIA but they never include heritage impact. We are suggesting that they should also do this," he said, adding that Abang Johari shared that this would fall under the purview of the Ministry of Tourism, Arts, Culture, Youth and Sports.

SHS also raised the need to strengthen public policy as well as regulatory, financing and enforcement framework on existing buildings and heritage regulations.

It also asked for a strengthening of the cultural heritage management framework, suggesting it could start with a

candid, independent review of the current status of Sarawak's heritage conservation and management.

In addition, SHS suggested providing government measures to commensurate maintenance requirements of gazetted government-owned heritage sites, provide financial support to selected heritage conservation projects, and financial incentives for private owners of built heritage to conserve and maintain their assets.

"We also hope to do our convention on heritage next year," added Ridu.

POSITION PAPER

November 2017

Overview

The Sarawak Heritage Society (SHS) was set up as a non-partisan, non-governmental and non-profit organization in 2007. Our mission is to promote the conservation, permanent preservation and sustainable management of Sarawak's unique cultural heritage assets, both tangible (buildings, monuments, sites, cultural landscapes, objects) and intangible (traditional arts and crafts, music, songs and dances, customs and traditions, food etc.)

Over the years SHS has organised talks, film screenings and visits to raise heritage awareness for its members, the public and schools. It has participated in the development of the Kuching Heritage Trail, piloted community engagement programmes, helped in training tourist guides, and raised the alarm on some threatened heritage assets. The upgraded SHS website (sarawakheritagesociety.com) and Facebook pages provide an improved platform for knowledge sharing and exchange of views.

SHS believes that the delicate balance between short-term economic development and heritage protection can be achieved. Many studies have demonstrated the positive economic impact of agile heritage conservation and management. Indeed wise heritage preservation can provide a significant boost to property values, job creation, business earnings, household incomes and tourism. However, SHS is of the view that while the economic considerations are important, they should not be the main driver of our cultural heritage protection. Heritage conservation should be primarily an endeavour by Sarawakians because we are proud of what we have. It is "Tourism from Heritage" rather than "Heritage for Tourism".

SHS advocates the creation of clear and coordinated policy, strategy, regulatory, institutional and financial frameworks to support heritage conservation and management. The Sarawak Cultural Heritage Ordinance enacted in 1993 may need to be reviewed and updated, then enforced more consistently. We also need to incorporate cultural heritage management into the planning process, alongside economic, social and environmental considerations. Government should also proceed with the gazetting of heritage sites that have already been identified and Government Budget allocations should be set aside for key heritage management projects and incentivising heritage conservation.

Although limited by human and financial resources, SHS could mobilise a small technical team to conduct a rapid assessment of the public policy, regulatory, institutional, financing and enforcement framework. This would require information collection from the concerned Government stakeholders. SHS could also facilitate a baseline technical study by independent consultants on Kuching's heritage zone.

SHS View of the Heritage Situation in Sarawak

Sarawak has an extraordinary history with a diversity of peoples bringing about a real confluence over the years. This has created a unique fusion of architectures and monuments, customs and traditions, arts and crafts, song and dance, and generally lifestyle, sometimes called the “Sarawakian way”. It has made Sarawak a verdant place for good, secure, pleasant and quality living. Our wholesome, rich and unique heritage is a precious gift, not only for Sarawakians, but also for visitors and indeed for mankind. “*My heritage has been my grounding and it has brought me peace*”, the actress Maureen O’Hara once wrote.

1. Managing and protecting our cultural heritage

Management of cultural heritage is important to strengthen Sarawak’s identity in a fast-moving world, swept along by market-driven forces of globalisation. This applies both to ‘tangible’ heritage (buildings, monuments, sites, cultural landscapes, objects) and ‘intangible’ heritage (traditional arts and crafts, song and dance, cultural practices). It is the blend of the two that gives Sarawak its unique ‘sense of place’. It is in everyone’s interest that Sarawak’s heritage be robustly protected and further enhanced by all Sarawak residents and by the State Government.

Protecting our heritage does not mean freezing our development. Rather, well managed heritage contributes to sustainable development. SHS acknowledges that the trade-off between short term economic development and heritage protection requires a delicate and expert balance. We strive to contribute resolutely and constructively to achieving this balance.

2. Heritage and Economy

Many studies have shown the positive economic impact of agile heritage conservation and management. Indeed heritage conservation can be a substantial revenue earner for the state. Considering only built-heritage, experience shows that conservation initiatives can have sizeable impact on jobs, business earnings, household incomes, property values (with city revitalisation programmes), and on tourism. Well-managed cultural heritage brings in tourists/visitors. One might say that Sarawak’s rich cultural heritage and natural heritage (including biodiversity) are the two main pillars of the “Sarawak brand” which is a major draw of tourists. Wisely managed cultural heritage can decisively enhance the perception of Sarawak by outsiders.

However cultural heritage protection initiatives should not be driven merely by tourism promotion considerations. The SHS view is that heritage conservation should primarily be an endeavour by the Sarawak people anchored on our feeling of pride in wanting to showcase what we have. In other words, we believe in “Tourism from Heritage” rather than “Heritage for Tourism”.

3. Heritage and Public Policy

Heritage conservation and management require clearly articulated and coordinated policy, strategy, regulatory, institutional and financial

frameworks. It appears that up to now, these have not been affirmed priorities of Sarawak's public policies. One reason could be that they embody long term objectives, which may have diffuse short term benefits. Another reason may be that sound, productive heritage management is a delicate, complex and demanding task involving a multiplicity of skillsets (planners, economists, sociologists, architects, engineers, etc.) and stakeholders (various Government or Government-related authorities, professional bodies, community organisations, etc.). Some of the required skills may not be readily available, and integrated approaches often face challenges.

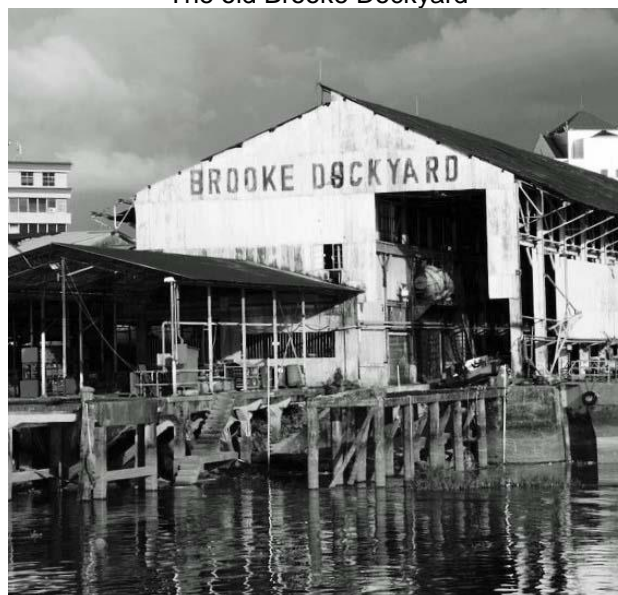
4. Heritage Legislation and Planning

Although the Sarawak Cultural Heritage Ordinance was enacted in 1993, it seems to have been sparsely applied. To our knowledge, few heritage sites (if any) have been actually gazetted since 1986. Also the Ordinance is silent on some topics such as underwater cultural heritage (e.g. shipwrecks), and there may be legal overlaps with the Malaysia National Heritage Act 2005. In view of this, and also to include latest global 'best practices' on heritage management, SHS views that the Ordinance and subsidiary regulations should be reviewed and updated.

Over the years, this situation has led to the loss or deterioration of a number of valuable buildings or sites, or damage to their environment. From the perspective of the public and SHS, many heritage sites still remain under threat, especially from "spotty", not clearly prioritized or uncoordinated initiatives. Even Government-owned built heritage assets, which are supposedly protected, have suffered from poor enforcement or maintenance.

To be effective, cultural heritage management needs to be fully incorporated in the planning process in addition to economic, social and environmental considerations. In the area of built heritage, in order to counterbalance the constraints imposed by heritage regulations on the owners of heritage assets, there is a need for tangible incentives to encourage conservation, with funds provided for in the Government budget.

What SHS Would Like to See Happen

A. From the Government

(1) Strengthened public policy, regulatory, financing and enforcement framework:

There should be stronger enforcement of the existing building and heritage regulations. For example, the historical centre of Kuching is a landscape of rampant illegal, often unsightly building extensions, signages and loud colours.



(2) Strengthened cultural heritage management framework.

The framework would have diverse facets, e.g. policy, strategy, regulatory, and financial. Our view is that the first step should be to commission a candid, independent review of the current status of Sarawak's heritage conservation and management.

The actual gazettement of heritage sites that have long been in the pipeline for listing, as well as additional sites and areas, e.g. the old Hokkien School, Siniawan Bazaar, the old Brooke Dockyard, and creation of a gazetted heritage zone (with specific conservation requirements) for the historical centre of Kuching, based on an heritage asset inventory.

(3) Government Budget Allocations.

The State may need to consider providing Government budgets or measures (i) commensurate to the maintenance requirements of the gazetted government-owned heritage sites, (ii) providing financial support to selected heritage conservation projects and (iii) providing financial incentives to private owners of built heritage to conserve and maintain their assets.

B. From all Stakeholders

- (1) Increased public awareness of heritage protection and conservation issues
- (2) Grassroot willingness to highlight to SHS and relevant agencies those areas where heritage assets are being damaged or improvement to heritage management is required.
- (3) Active participation by holders of heritage assets in their conservation and management.

How SHS can Play a Key Role

SHS is a small organisation with limited human and financial resources. One of our key strengths is that our members are passionate about heritage conservation and management and have spent time thinking and discussing the subject. SHS has also delivered a variety of programmes to enhance heritage awareness among civil society.

SHS is confident that we can contribute and value-add to the heritage scene. Here are several concrete ways:

1. Conduct a rapid assessment of the public policy, regulatory, financing and enforcement framework with a small SHS-led technical team. This team would need relevant information from the stakeholders involved, primarily the Ministry of Tourism, Arts and Culture; the Sarawak Museum Dept.; the State Planning Authority; Lands and Surveys; the two Kuching municipalities; and LCDA. For such an exercise to be fruitful, the concerned institutions should be mandated to share their information and discuss issues openly. This assessment could be followed by a workshop to discuss findings and chart the way forward.
2. Facilitate a baseline technical study by independent consultants on Kuching's heritage zone. The content of such a study could be the following:
 - (a) Provide an expert assessment of the built and intangible heritage conservation potential of the Kuching heritage core, taking into account current and proposed programmes and projects (e.g. Heritage Square, Heritage Trail, Keep Kuching Clean, Beautiful and Safe initiative, etc)
 - (b) Outline proposals for a mid-term strategy and planning itinerary for the heritage core
 - (c) Draft a Concept Paper / Terms of Reference for the preparation of an Inventory of Heritage Assets and a Special Area Plan for the heritage core
 - (d) Present a technical opinion and suggestions on conservation itineraries that could be envisaged for specific assets such as the old Brooke Dockyard and the old Hokkien school building at Jalan Tabuan.

ThinkCity Sdn Bhd, which has done valuable work in these areas in Penang and other parts of Malaysia, could be a good candidate to undertake such assignment.

3. SHS will continue its efforts to raise public awareness through

- site visits, field trips, study tours, outings, large and small conferences, forums, talks;
- communication (website, Facebook, publications);
- better structuring of information on various aspects of Sarawak cultural heritage,
 - leverage on our website or FB community,
 - set up a structured photo bank of heritage assets,
 - development of a mobile app to support the Heritage Trail, etc.
- collaboration with other stakeholders involved in heritage conservation: beyond Government agencies, partnerships with Friends of Sarawak Museum, PAM (Malaysian Institute of Architects), Badan Warisan Malaysia, other heritage trusts and societies, and ThinkCity.
- sourcing sponsorship for project financing, building on the tax incentives that the private sector can call for when sponsoring heritage conservation activities.
